Raising a concern with the Charity Commission (CC47): updated guidance

The guidance has been updated to make it clearer when to raise concerns about a charity with the Commission, as well as what the Commission can and cannot do in its capacity as regulator.

Out-of-School Settings and safeguarding: call for evidence

The Department for Education is calling for evidence to help shape future safeguarding policy for the Out-of-School settings (OOSS) sector. This diverse sector includes providers such as tuition centres, extracurricular clubs, youth groups (e.g. Scouts and Brownies), holiday camps, activity centres and **faith-based education settings**.

The consultation is seeking views on existing safeguarding practices in Out-of-School settings and potential options to strengthen safeguarding across the sector. Contributions will help ensure that children attend safe and trusted settings.

Law Commission consultation on New Funerary Methods

For information and possibly for action

The Law Commission has published a <u>Consultation Paper on New Funerary Methods</u> – potential alternatives to the established methods of burial, cremation and burial at sea. Although new funerary methods are not currently regulated in England and Wales, some are available in other countries.

As part of the Commission's overall project on Burial, Cremation and New Funerary Methods, the Consultation Paper examines the conception of a new funerary method, legislation governing new funerary methods in other jurisdictions, the nature and scope of future regulation and the principles which could inform it. The Commission is seeking views from potential operators of new funerary methods, those who are interested in using them, funeral directors, others involved in the death care sector and anyone with an interest in this area.

The consultation is open until **4 September**. Responses can be made using the online form available on the project webpage. Respondents do not need to answer all the questions if they are only interested in some aspects of the consultation.

CLAS is a member of the Churches' Funerals Group, which is currently considering a response. We should be interested to see any responses from individual denominations.

Trustee information: a reminder from OSCR

For action

From **30 June 2025**, OSCR will begin <u>collecting charity trustee information through OSCR</u> <u>Online</u>. Providing this information will become a legal requirement for all charities.

Charity users must submit trustee details using OSCR Online. Any charity completing a new online annual return created on or after 30 June 2025 will be required to include trustee information as part of the submission.

Before this date, make sure that you:

- inform all trustees about this upcoming change;
- collect the required trustee information (see our website for a <u>list of the required</u> information); and
- ensure that relevant individuals (up to three per charity) <u>have access to OSCR</u> <u>Online</u>.

Heat and Energy Efficiency Technical Suitability Assessment (HEETSA)

For action

The Scottish Government is setting out a consultation on the Heat and Energy Efficiency Technical Suitability Assessment (HEETSA), a process beyond the current Energy Performance Certificates (EPC) for assessments of buildings to confirm which energy and clean heat measures would be appropriate for given buildings.

The Scottish Government is seeking views of stakeholders, including social landlords, on the concept of HEETSA and how it relates to other parts of the heating and retrofit landscape, how it relates to the current EPC regime, and what the right methodologies to employ for it would be.

The consultation can be accessed here, and supporting documents can be accessed here. The consultation will close on **29 August**.
