PRESIDENT'S NEW YEAR MESSAGE

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At the beginning of a new year, one of the passages of scripture we often hear, is where Jesus was presented at the Temple as recorded in Luke 2. While Mary and Joseph were at the Temple, they met two people advanced in years who had had a special revelation, called Simeon and Anna. It was said of Simeon:

'It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Christ' (Luke 2:26 NIV)

We are not told when he had received the prophecy or how long it had been before he experienced the fulfilment, but we can understand from these words that he had reflected on what God had in store for him and believed God's promise. He went on to say:

'For my eyes have seen your salvation' (Luke 2:30 NIV)

We live in a society that looks for instant fulfilment, one that probably is



more interested in the speed rather than the quality. Simeon possibly waited years or even decades for the blessing he received. He had the patience not to lose heart and doubt God's promise.

This is an example for us as we look for what God has in store for us in 2025. With Simeon we have seen God's salvation in Jesus and there is abundant blessing in store for us. God does not always give instant fulfilment and we sometimes need to be patient in waiting for God to reveal the next steps in our service and the blessing He has for us and banish the doubts the evil one will tempt us with.

7. That the Lord Jesus Christ is the Head of the Church.

A REASON FOR WORSHIP AND TO BE THANKFUL

We see true leadership in action through the parables of The Good Shepherd and The Prodigal Son. God is pictured as strong, gracious and trustworthy, who is proactively seeking to rescue and then celebrate, defend, protect and provide for the lost sheep and wayward son.

Reflecting on the picture of the

Shepherd; consider the difference between Jesus and ourselves. The difference between a shepherd and his sheep; in wisdom, knowledge, strength, authority, discipline, bravery and compassion. But at the same time consider how Jesus became man, born into humble surroundings, welcomed by shepherds and made a little lower than the angels.

Reflecting on the picture of the

Father; consider how he was firm with the elder sons judgmental, legalism, yet patiently waited for the younger son to return home. How he ran, embraced, welcomed and celebrated him, then clothed, fed, defended and restored the one who had squandered his wealth and reputation.

A REASON TO FOLLOW AND SUBMIT

Consider the difference between the head and all the other body parts, seen and unseen. It is the head that instructs, controls and brings unity to all the other parts. The head is also aware of the body, aware of pain, tension, pleasure and taste. It's the head that responds in kind, to the body's needs, using at times the rest of the body.

We are given other similar pictures from the Bible of our relationship to God; the capstone to a building, husband to his wife, Father to His son and King to His subjects. In each of these images we appreciate powerful truths of; the love of a husband and father, protection, strength and wisdom of a king and a shepherd; to the true capstone by which the whole building is measured, supported and defined.

WHO HOLDS THE AUTHORITY IN THE LOCAL CHURCH?

Jesus Christ is the Head of the Church is our subject, and this means that He holds the final authority in all matters. In becoming a Christian, we acknowledge that we have become His subjects and He is our King. We submit to His rule. We believe His word hold final authority in all matters. So as a local Church and as congregation of believers, through the teaching of His word, we submit to His authority and through His Spirit are led in the process of decision making.

OVERSEAS MISSIONS **'HOPE FOR CHILDREN'** Project 2024-2025 HELEN VIPASS VISITS JUMP

On 6th November 2024 Helen spoke at an event organised by Ian Sykes at our Jump Church. I attended the event and took some notes so here is a summary of what was said.

March 2024 marked the 30th Anniversary of Hope for Children.

Helen was born in the UK and her Dad was Latvian. She learnt Russian and worked in Siberia for a time, then came back to the UK thinking that this would be where she would settle. However. God called her to serve in Latvia in 1991 just before the Baltic States regained their independence from the Soviet Union. These changes led to extreme poverty as lots of factories closed, families became homeless. some children were abandoned, and alcoholism was rife. Helen and a small group of people started to work with the street children. At this time charities were unheard of in Latvia and so their work was treated with suspicion at first and it took a while to gain people's trust. In time Hope for Children became established.

Now 800 families a year are supported by the small family centre in Riga that the WRU project is raising funds to renovate. The charity is built on Christian values and everyone is upheld in prayer.

The families are supported in lots of practical ways and they are given the opportunity to have quality time together such as games days at the centre and summer camps at a summer house by the sea.

Children are given birthday and Christmas gifts which are very much treasured.

There is still a lot of poverty and state support is much less than in the UK even though food prices are about the same.

Many of the people who now work at the family centre have personal experience of being on the streets. A local businessman who now supports the charity was once one of the boys that Hope for Children supported.

Helen shared with us that along with our financial support there are

also opportunities for people from the UK to go out to Latvia and volunteer. This could be short term from as little as a week to longer term.

Such opportunities include:

- Serving on a team on day camps in the Summer, leading activities.
- Assisting in the family centre with sorting and mending donations of clothing.
- Painting, decorating, gardening and handyman jobs.
- Cooking.

I have more details about these opportunities - please email me if you're interested in finding out more. Overseas Missions have a small training fund that could contribute towards any expenses such as airfares and accommodation.

ST ANDREW

PATRON SAINT OF SCOTLAND PART TWO

Following on from last time, now let's a closer look at Andrew the apostle – perhaps after all not such a surprising choice of patron. One of Jesus' core team of twelve apostles, he is best known for playing second fiddle. Throughout the gospels he is Andrew - the brother of Simon (Peter). We must assume that Peter was the elder brother. Although they lived and worked together, it's always 'Simon and Andrew his brother' or 'Simon's house' or 'Simon's boat'.

Simon was the one with the big personality, a natural leader: active, impetuous, even rash, throwing himself with all his considerable force and enthusiasm and the whole of his being where his good heart led him. One can imagine the boys in childhood, Simon leading them into daring scrapes and Andrew faithfully following, an admiring lieutenant. He would have been completely loyal. When Simon obeys the command to follow Jesus, Andrew goes too. After the crucifixion he is there is the upper room with the other disciples, but he doesn't visit the tomb. Just after the resurrection, he is back there at their old livelihood with Simon Peter and the other four Galilean fishers.

Unlike Simon Peter, he is not one of the inner circle.

He is not invited into the room when Jairus' daughter is revived (Luke 8:51) He is not invited up on to the mount of transfiguration to witness the Godhead and messiahship of Christ confirmed. But then he was not the one who dared to answer Christ's earlier question: "and who do you say that I am?" And he was not the one to challenge the unpalatable truths of His messiahship that Jesus was attempting to share with all his disciples. ('this will never happen to you'). That was Peter's role, desperate to understand, although maybe most of the disciples were longing to ask those questions. Nor did Andrew put himself forward for any sort of preeminence or place of honour, like the sons of Zebedee. Andrew was a born follower, not a leader.

There are two places in the gospels where we meet Andrew on his own, as it were and the first of these is very interesting. According to the synoptic gospels' account of the calling of the first apostles, Jesus summoned Simon and Andrew simultaneously – at that moment, they were both in the same boat! But according to the evangelist John, who gives us more detail and should know better than anyone since he was actually there, it was in fact



Andrew who led his brother to Iesus. Andrew and 'the other disciple' (thought to be John himself) were already disciples of John the Baptist. This means that Andrew was already actively seeking for the Messiah who would save Israel and prepared to follow him. John the Baptist (telling them plainly 'I am not the messiah') pointed out Jesus after His baptism to the two young men - "behold the lamb of God". Immediately, we are told, they left the Baptist and followed Jesus. They spent the day with him. Only afterwards, Andrew went to tell his big brother (one wonders if John also went off to find James, because after that, they too are always mentioned together). Why wasn't Simon Peter already following John Baptist? Perhaps he needed to be summoned, to be ordered, by a larger personality than his own: by the true authority of Christ, the true leader of Israel? Did the natural leadership in Peter's character respond to the true and higher authority of Jesus? Whereas Andrew was a seeker and a follower first: and according to John, he was Jesus' first disciple. (John 1:35 - 42).

And the second occasion – well that's for next time.
