In the early hours of the 29th April a team of seven from Mexborough made our way to Heathrow to catch our flight to Tirana, the capital of Albania. After months of planning and preparation we were finally on our way to work with Sparks Ministries in Shengjin and with a small church in nearby Lezhe, by the coast of the Adriatic Sea. Sparks Ministries, founded by a fellow student at Bible College almost 25 years ago, is involved in front line evangelism amongst children and in more recent years has extended its reach to youth and Afghan refugees who have settled in this part of Albania. The team were kept busy with three childrens' outreaches, a youth meeting, time spent with the junior leaders of Sparks, three ladies' meetings and mens' fellowship times. We also took the weekend meeting and Bible study at the Lezhe. Whilst there, it was good to be able to visit the new and larger building the Lezhe church are planning to buy over the next few months - it's three times the size of their current building, is central in the town and will enable them to minister effectively in the community with various outreach

projects. On behalf of Mexborough Life Church we were able to give them a financial gift towards their new building.

Over the course of our 10-day mission, it was wonderful to see the team work so well together in unity and for individuals to leave their comfort zones at various times. Each member shared morning devotions, meaningful fellowship took place with our Albanian brothers and sisters, many seeds sown and some felt a desire to continue their missions' journey in the future. One member is hoping to return to the area in the summer to help with the Summer Children's

Camp that takes place each year. Others would like to go on mission again next year that MLCC is planning to organise.

After 30 years of leading short term missions, I have been reminded again that 'the fields are still white unto harvest'. We praise God for what He is doing around the world, but many more still need to hear the good news of Jesus. Prayerfully consider sending or taking a team on mission. Lives will be changed - not only those we go to but especially those who go.

4. That God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, and that He is truly God and truly Man, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Surely one of the best-known verses of Scripture is John 3:16 and I would encourage you to read it again – slowly and prayerfully. Now, read it again and make it personal – "for God so loved <u>ME</u> that He gave.....) This verse reminds us that God didn't simply give us His Son, but His <u>ONLY</u> Son. What depth of love that simple statement shows – the depth of His love for me – and for you!

As if that wasn't amazing enough, we go on to remind ourselves that this Saviour was born as a baby to a young girl who was still a virgin. Conception took place supernaturally through the medium of the Holy Spirit. The actual birth of Jesus was completely natural in every way – the true miracle took place nine months earlier at the time of conception – that was the amazing and miraculous part of the Christmas story.

We knew from the beginning that this baby was to be someone special – He was (is) completely human and yet completely divine – truly God and truly man. In order to obtain our salvation, he had to be completely human so that our full humanity could be saved. Forgiveness of our sin could not have taken place if He was not fully God. So, the combination of full humanity and full divinity was essential in order for our salvation to be made possible.

This baby became our Saviour and so often we refer to Him as "Jesus Christ our Lord" – and rightly so. *JESUS* was the name given to Him at his birth (Mt 1:21) pointing us to the fact that He was to provide us with salvation. *CHRIST* means "anointed one" – again, foreshadowed in the nativity gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. The title *LORD* speaks of His authority and our submission to it. When we become a Christian, that last title becomes personal – Jesus, Christ *MY* Lord.

It is said that "familiarity breeds contempt" and so we need to continually remind ourselves of this amazing truth from scripture – that He is <u>MY</u> Saviour and <u>MY</u> Lord.

This is the 175th Anniversary of the Wesleyan Reform Union. We were reminded by George Phillips in the introductory comments in the handbook of our Conference of the extract of Scripture in the original 'Declaration of Principles' that has been our motto over the history of the Union, 'One is your Master, even Christ, and all ye are brethren.'

As we gathered, we remembered the President, Rev. Michael Hedley and Lindsay in our prayers as they could not be with us due to his ill health. For the year 2024/25 George Phillips agreed to take on the role of President for which we are so thankful.

Women of Action – have been continuing their 'He Restores my Soul' series; their new teaching series is 'Solid Foundation.'
Prayer is a vital part of the journey of the WA, with Prayer Meetings being held on Zoom and in person – all ladies are most welcome.

The trustees reported that the work in changing to a CIO continues, aiming for completion on 31st March 2025.

Home Missions and YPD (Young People's Department) – It is really encouraging to hear of churches baptising new believers and that the Gospel is being preached faithfully. This department wants to support your work wherever they can. The members of the Committee meet on Zoom and would love you to join them to pray and discuss how they can support the churches. Treasurer's Report – Finances remain strong, although this is largely due to the sale of closed churches. However, this money is being put to good use and the Treasurer reported that since 2010, £1.9m has been made available to churches through grants.

Overseas Missions Department – Lindsay Hedley was thanked for her time as Secretary, Anne-



Marie Wilcock is now the Team Coordinator. The 'Safe Haven' project to provide meals to children in Lebanon has come to an end; over the two years in excess of £11,200 was raised. The new project was launched - 'Hope for Children' in Latvia. Ian Sykes will be heading this up – look out for (or ask for) details in your church!

Ministers Provident Society -Celebrates its centenary this year in its present form. 100 years later, ministers and their widows / widowers are being cared for with a financial gift each quarter.

Equip to Serve (E 2 S) is the new name for the Local Preachers Fellowship. The reason is that they want to ensure that they are fulfilling their calling to encourage not only preachers but all church members in their ministry. With this in mind - keep Saturday 5th October free and join them at 'Bringing Community into Church' - look out for details.

Ministerial Committee reported that they are now in a position to accept students on the Theology

Course - highly recommended! Contact Alina at HQ for details.




Guess who I saw!

Hazel now lives in Birmingham to be near her son. She will soon be 89 and still takes every opportunity to speak about the Lord.




