THE GREATNESS AND AMAZING DETAIL OF THE EASTER STORY

He is risen!' sounds through our congregations on Easter morning, with the response 'He is risen indeed!' The cry is ingrained in believers' souls.

Jesus' death and resurrection was the most crucial event in the entire history of the universe. Our Christian faith not only depends on it but is imbued by it. The account in John's Gospel (20) shows the power of the risen Christ and the compassion of His heart. For He interrupted the most sacred journey of all time to comfort and reassure a grieving woman, one of His closest followers.

Mary Magdalene could not let go of Jesus. She had found her life and her worth in Him. Jesus had been the centre of her life her rock, and now not only had He been murdered, but His body stolen. Peering into the tomb she saw angels sitting where his body had been, but she was not overwhelmed by them. Then Jesus appeared behind her, and said her name, 'Mary.'

She was ecstatic, and He had to prevent her holding on to Him. Don't touch me," He cautioned, "for I haven't yet





ascended to the Father. But go find my brothers and tell them that I ascend to my Father and your Father, my God and your God,' (John 20:17). Some commentators say that He was warning Mary not to hold Him back, and others point to the commandment in Haggai 2:13 about the rules when presenting the sacrificial blood of atonement. He was preparing to enter the heavenly temple with His own blood to obtain eternal redemption for us. But whichever way you look at it, whatever the reason, the fact is that He paused to give hope to a woman with a broken heart.

Every story in the Bible is there for a reason. I believe that this one is the pathway to one of the greatest hopes – that **the One who rules the universe will never let us go and will meet us at the point of our deepest need.**

JESUS CLEANSES THE TEMPLE Matthew 21 Verses 12 – 17 (Please read)

This act of cleansing the Temple was the second one recorded in the gospels, for in John chapter 2 v 12 to 25 we have the first cleansing which took place at the beginning of his ministry just after the wedding in Canna. This second cleansing took place at the end of his ministry after the triumphal entry into Jerusalem. It is not surprising that this happened on more than one occasion because lesus attended the major festivals in Jerusalem from a young age. At 12 years old he was found by Mary and Joseph sitting with the teachers of the law and questioning them. So these two incidents are rather like book ends of his ministry, one at the beginning and one at the end. On this occasion the Temple was once again defiled by the religious leaders. This "market" most likely took place in the court of the Gentiles. It was a place where Gentile men could go and be instructed about the one true God, the God of Israel. It was part of the outreach of the Temple leaders. The market began as a service and convenience to foreign Jews where they could exchange money for the temple coinage and purchase animals and birds for sacrifice. But the religious leaders had turned it into a lucrative business, charging exorbitant prices, and no one could compete or oppose them. Therefore, the religious leaders were ignoring their responsibility to their witness and stopping the Gentiles from hearing about God. They were putting a stumbling block in their way. They were not putting God first in their lives. They were more interested in money than they were in God. Commentators and historians tell us that Annas.

a former high priest was the manager of this enterprise. No wonder that Jesus was angry at what he saw happening.

The scriptures say that we can't serve two masters. We either put God first in our lives or we put material things first. We can't do both. **So, we have to make the choice, is it God first in our lives or material gain.**

When Jesus called the Temple 'my house', he was affirming that he is God. When he called it 'my house of prayer', he was quoting **Isaiah 56 v** 7, this chapter in **Isaiah** denounces the unfaithful leaders of Israel. The phrase 'den of thieves' comes from **Jeremiah 7 v 11**, and is part of a speech that Jeremiah gave at the gate of the temple rebuking the people for the same sins that Jesus saw in his day.

Why did Jesus call it a den of thieves? Because the place where thieves hide is a Den. The religious leaders and some of the people were using the temple and the Jewish religion to cover up their sins. What does God want in His house? He wants praise and true prayer, for this is evidence of our dependence on Him and our faith in His word. He also wants His people to tell others about Jesus, to be true witnesses for Him, that others might come to Him and own the Lord Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord. The needy should feel welcome and find the help they need. And there should be the Power of God working to change people.


IN OUR LIVES FIRST: Meditations for Counselors Book by Diane Langberg

Many caring jobs place a heavy burden on the carer. As you listen to the lives and fears of others, you cannot help but be affected, disturbed, saddened or tempted yourself. To carry other people's burdens can sink you in mire of despair, or even leave you tainted by the sin confessed or witnessed. I have worked alongside social workers, I've worked in a rehab unit and with young offenders. Now as a Pastor, preparing funerals, or sitting with those in their last days, can carry very heavy burdens. I have a friend who is a barrister, who after working in court, comes home and sits alone reading a

Psalm to almost cleanse his mind of what he has dealt with at work. As carers we must look after our own minds, soul, spirit and conscience.

I have found this book by Diane Langberg incredibly helpful and insightful. It is thoroughly Biblical in its approach, yet very easy to read. You could use it as a daily devotion, with each meditation ministering into our own personal souls, through the light of scripture and the gospel.


A Different View of Life

He is not here, He has risen! Matthew 28:1-7 (NIV)

Every Easter Sunday morning people from Hampden View walked over to Philadelphia Church as it was their Sunday School Anniversary. We would all sit up in the balcony and the first hymn they sang was always,



I had never heard it sung like that before and even now 69 years later it remains one of my favourite hymns. Shortly after I began attending Hampden View, I became a Christian and have tried to serve Jesus ever since. I married Edwin from Philadelphia Church in 1963 and God has blessed us with two children and four grandchildren.

When Covid restrictions started to ease, Hampden View joined with Philadelphia in their building to worship together on a Sunday as we were able to spread out and felt very safe. It has been really good for both churches to share together again like we often did almost 70 years ago, with the same message that the Lord Jesus is risen.

The day we have been waiting for has dawned, Jesus has burst out of the tomb and is alive forever. The events of over 2000 years ago are brought alive once more. Easter day is not just about chocolate, Easter eggs, egg hunts and the Easter Bunny - all exciting things - and family time spent together, but being able to celebrate the empty tomb and the resurrection of the Lord Jesus. Jesus conquered death and is alive for evermore. He lives in my heart; does he live in yours?
