3. We believe that all have sinned and come short of the glory of God, and are thereby subject to God's wrath and condemnation.

A friend shared a story of a person who attended an Alpha Course for the first time. During a discussion group it was shared that 'Jesus died to save us from our sins'. The person declared that they had never sinned and therefore had no need of Jesus and left! To that person sin was murder or stealing, they failed to comprehend that sin can be anger, envy or gossiping; seemingly trivial in comparison.

Is your heart heavy like mine reading that? Let us also be challenged, they are not alone in their lack of understanding. We can say "I believe...," but it is essential to know in Whom we believe and why.

Our third Statement of Faith is a big theme to cover in a few words, but Paul is not ambiguous in his statement 'for ALL have sinned and fall short of the glory of God (Romans 3:23)'. Our sin is the condition of our hearts toward God. It is sin that separates us from an intimate relationship with our Father God. It means living without freedom from sin or hope for the future. I don't want anyone to live without hearing the Good News of Jesus, do you?

As I am writing, it is post-Easter, and I am drawn again to the Emmaus Road (Luke 24) and the wonderful Bible study they received from our Resurrected Lord, Who, by interpreting Scripture, revealed Himself to be the fulfilment of God's eternal plan of salvation for the world.

I believe, in the beginning, God created a perfect world and He

created humankind in His image - that is good and without sin, living in a free relationship with God, and they were blessed. Perhaps Jesus began with Genesis 3, when the conflict with sin began and the relationship changed. The consequence of their disobedience is separation from God, IS DEATH, not just for them but also for all humankind.

But God's desire for His people is to be like Him, and He is holy. By choosing to live in our sinful state means we are in rebellion against God.

Scripture tells us that by nature we are slaves to sin and objects of wrath (Ephesians 2:3). The only way to satisfy God's righteous wrath is Christ's once-for-all sacrifice, without this, our hope of eternal life is extinguished, and we all perish. But hallelujah, the world was loved in an amazing way, because God gave His ONLY Son - 'there was no other good enough,' as the Hymnist writes. God demonstrated His love for us in this: 'while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.'

By accepting God's offer of salvation by grace, which comes through faith, we can rejoice with Paul knowing, '... there is no condemnation for those who belong to Christ Jesus (Romans 8:1).'

Our only hope is found in Christ Jesus, may our hearts burn within us, and shine out of us as we pray and share the good news to ALL.

RISING FROM THE ASHES



Exactly five years ago, 15th April 1919. TV screens reported the terrible news that fire had broken out in the roof space of Notre Dame cathedral, a UNESCO World Heritage site since 1991. We watched aghast as the firefighters battled all evening into the following days to extinguish the fierce blaze engulfing the roof and spire. We prayed that the damage could be limited and the cathedral saved. There was an overwhelming outpouring of support from the international community after President Macron promised that the cathedral would be rebuilt, setting out a five year timetable for its completion. Pledges totalling hundreds of millions of euros flowed in.

The cathedral was initiated by Maurice de Sully, bishop of Paris in 1163, taking about two hundred vears to build. From the midtwelfth century, the Church granted indulgences (forgiveness of sins) to those who would help to build a church or cathedral. Did they not realise that Jesus died to forgive our sins? Therefore, rather than going on crusades to absolve their sins, people dedicated more money and effort to the construction of houses of God with great enthusiasm and ambition desiring to excel in this quest of constructing magnificent buildings reflecting God's glory.

King Louis IX deposited relics of the Cross including the Crown of thorns, a nail and a slither of the Cross, which he had purchased at great expense from Emperor Baldwin II. Napoleon was crowned here in 1804 and Victor Hugo's historical novel, The Hunchback of Notre Dame was set around the cathedral. In 1909 Joan of Arc was beatified in the cathedral.

The renovations are estimated to cost around 800 million euros which seems a staggering amount. Notre Dame cathedral will rise from the ashes enabling all its beauty, history and artefacts to be on view again.

Whether this building was built to glorify man or God, there is no doubt that its craftsmanship, beauty and proclamation for God needed to be preserved. The NAME of our Lord IS a strong tower.



Local charity Bright Hope in North West Leicestershire (formerly Hospice Hope) took possession of Bright Hope House, its new, purpose-built daycare centre on 9 February 2024. The facility in Swannington has been funded by Bloor Homes. The state-of-the-art 6,000 square feet centre boasts two complementary therapy rooms, counselling rooms, a quiet room, a workshop for hobbies and training / technical facilities. It also has commercial kitchen facilities, a dining room and lounge and a conference room and offices.

The new centre can accommodate up to 24 people in day care for three days a week, where guests can enjoy daily activities and a hot meal at lunchtime. It will also host a wide range of services provided by Bright Hope and its partner organisations.

North West Leicestershire District Council has provided the charity with a 150-year lease on the land at a peppercorn rent, so it can call the building home for many years to come.

The charity provides daycare, counselling, befriending, and complementary therapy for people with life-limiting conditions, allowing carers to take a well-earned break. It offers similar services at its

three support cafes in Ashby, Whitwick and Ibstock. A bereavement hub is also held at the centre. A dedicated team of more than 80 active and experienced volunteers support the charity and its service users.

Stewart Shepherd, Bright Hope's Chair of Trustees, said: "This wonderful collaboration between the council, Bloor Homes and our charity is unique. It enables Bright Hope to develop and build on all we have learned and achieved over the past 20 years.

"The need for our services continues to grow and develop. We look forward to meeting that need now that Bright Hope House is open, when we'll be looking to work with the community and local businesses to support this excellent initiative."

All of the above happened as a result of a God given vision, much prayer and miracle after miracle. Since the inception, the charity has looked to God to provide wisdom, care, compassion and funds. He has not failed and we are now able to offer Him all the glory for this new £3.5m building and continue the work to bring glory to the One Who inspired the project from Day One.

The age of miracles is definitely not dead.
