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# FRIENDSHIP WITH THE CREATOR LEADS TO A HARVEST

Aristotle, said that while it might be possible to venerate and appease the gods, actual intimate friendship with a god was impossible.

### John 4

The Creator of the universe sits by a well. He is the Bread and Water of Life and yet He asks the local woman approaching Him for water. She is amazed that He a Jew and a man is even speaking to her. From the following conversation, we gather that she is very, very thirsty; thirsty for water (v15), thirsty for life, thirsty for love (v17) and thirsty for God (v20).

Jesus speaks with the woman as an equal, discussing the theology of prayer, the Father and the Spirit, prophesies of the Messiah, and she said of the conversation "He told me everything I ever did." In fact, He revealed to her things that even His disciples wouldn't grasp for another two years, nor did the great teacher Nicodemus about whom we read in the previous chapter.

When His disciples return from buying food from her very village, Jesus refuses their bread, saying "I have food to eat that you know nothing about." He was so thrilled with this woman's openness to Him, the gospel and to a new teaching on prayer, that His appetite had left Him. He could see the whole village becoming open to His gospel. It isn't only the Angels that are thrilled to see a person receiving the Water of



Life, and this news is like bread from heaven and satisfies even the Messiah Himself. He tells His disciples they are about to reap a harvest that they didn't sow. While they were getting bread, Jesus was sowing seeds, and now the whole village was on the move.

<sup>40</sup> So when the Samaritans came to him, they urged him to stay with them, and he stayed two days. <sup>41</sup> And because of his words many more became believers. <sup>42</sup> They said to the woman, "We no longer believe just because of what you said; now we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this man really is the Saviour of the world." <sup>43</sup> After the two days he left for Galilee.

I was broken hearted to leave Rushden, our son and grandchildren, our friends, my job, and of course our extended family at The Mission church. It was so hard to voice that final decision at the church meeting at the end of June 2021.

It wasn't a straightforward journey either as God did not reveal to us straight away what we would be moving into, just that we were to move.

Ian had had a vision of a new role in the union, he drafted the job spec and we thought this was going to be it. But in September Jan Ransom the director of Flame International approached Ian with the details of a role they were creating within the charity and wanted Ian to apply for it.

It is very hard to express on



paper and in so few words the full details of the months between September 2021 and January 2022 except to say there was a lot of prayer. We knew at the end of October that Ian had to withdraw his application for the role within the Union and wait to apply for the Flame role which was not advertised until January. Three months in limbo and then there was no guarantee that he would be offered the role. But we trusted God. He had brought us this far and He knew the plans He had for us, we just needed to continue being obedient and faithful.

It would have been so easy and comfortable to stay where we were, but having made that sacrifice God has blessed us beyond measure, and we are so grateful for all that He has done in us and through us and still has for us. Even when we don't understand or even don't prefer what God is calling us to, it is always better to trust Him and follow His leading.

# A Sure Foundation In Turbulent Times - Part 2

Dear Friend

He will be the sure foundation for your times, a rich store of salvation and wisdom and knowledge; the fear of the LORD is the key to this treasure. Isaiah 33:6 NIV

Isaiah's powerful statement links the sure foundation of God with three things, each of which apply not just to my ministry and that of Philo Trust, but to all of us who are Christians.

### First, we have a reliable rescue.

The gospel is a 'store of salvation'. All around us we see those who need rescuing from lives that are utterly meaningless, from pursuing hopes that deliver nothing and from feeding on desires that are ultimately destructive. But God does save and the Hebrew word here is closely related to Joshua and the name Jesus – the one who 'will save his people from their sins' (Matthew 1:21 NIV). In the tumult of our world we can confidently proclaim, 'Jesus can be trusted to save!'

# **Second, we have a rich resource.** The gospel offers a store of 'wisdom

and knowledge'. One of the challenges of our changing times is how we are overwhelmed by an infinity of words and images. But which of them are true? Which of them are helpful? And what, anyway, do we do about them? We need wisdom and insight, and here God offers us both. God's Word, both in writing as Scripture and in Christ Jesus, informs and instructs us. This passage in Isaiah may well be echoed in Colossians 2:3 when Paul writes of Christ, 'in whom are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge' (NIV). In bewildering times, we preach a God who, in

Christ, gives us a truth we can live by.

Finally, we have a reverent relationship. We read, 'the fear of the LORD is the key to this treasure'. Today, there are any number of 'religious products' on the market: beliefs, programmes and rituals, idols and illusions. Yet in the gospel we see a God who can be known personally through Christ. If we come to God in a reverent, humble attitude through Christ we can find in him a saviour for now and for eternity. In an unfriendly world, the gospel offers the ultimate friend: God himself.

These are changing, challenging times. Yet we can face them with the certainty of a living God, who in Jesus is our foundation of life. our salvation for life and our direction in life. It is my prayer and hope that this year Philo Trust and I will continue to boldly and confidently proclaim the Christ who so richly fulfils every aspect of Isaiah's promise. May that be true of you too! As we prepare for this new year, would you please prayerfully consider sowing financially into our ministry to seize the many open-doors of opportunity for a 'time such as this'?

# IS GOD MALE OR FEMALE



In March-April Contact magazine there was an article looking at how we address God. The author suggested that the time should be spent "sharing the Gospel to hell-bound sinners whilst the days of grace are still with us."

The author's enthusiasm for evangelism is commendable. However, one of my frustrations is the ability of the church to put people off by the use of inappropriate language. This asks the question how many have not heard Christ because of the language the church uses?"

Defences of the use of a male pronoun for God are based on two things; English translations of the Bible, and tradition. Tradition is fine, but, just because our forebears did something is not a reason to continue. We are not a project to preserve the past.

Translation is a fraught process. In Hebrew, nouns are gendered, this does not always sit well in English.

The article quotes Justin Welby who wisely said "God is not male or female. God is not definable." The article then goes on to defend the exclusive use of the male pronoun for God.

We should look at the facts.

- Jesus was born, and he was a man.
- Jesus called God "father".
- Jesus is referred to as the "son" of God.

I cannot think of any time when we could refer to Jesus other than as "He". To do so detracts from his humanity.

When it comes to God, it is not so clear cut. At the start of the Bible, we have an important sentence.

> "So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them."

Both men **and** women are made in the image of God! Once both sexes were created God was fully imaged. There are things about God that men put on display, and vice versa.

God is much more diverse than male or female. Some of this diversity is reflected in the name "Elohim".

Elohim is a plural form. Not used to suggest that there is more than one God, but to demonstrate God's diversity and enormity. There is a modern English usage which tries to avoid being sex specific by using "They". In view of the diverseness of God, might this be a solution?

The Holy Spirit is more controversial. The Hebrew word for spirit, ruach, is female. **There is a very strong case for referring to the Spirit as "She".** The hymn, "She sits like a bird, brooding on the waters" (S T F 393) encapsulates this.

Wisdom, identified as being with God, (Proverbs 8) is female. Traditionally identified as the Spirit of God, She was with God as the very beginning of things.

In our conversations about God, we need to be aware that the question is much bigger than our answer, limited by human ideas, and language.

God has attributes which are male and female. Our language, and outreach must try to accommodate this.


